OARA AND COUNCIL JOIN TOGETHER TO TALK RUBBISH

We had quite a gathering of residents eager to “Talk Rubbish” at our OGM on July 10. We were pleased to welcome Ian Collins, SCC Director for the Environment and Councillor Steve Leggett, then Cabinet Member whose responsibilities included Waste, as well as our own Bevois Councillors. The state of our streets and bins is an issue that affects us every day and one that is regularly raised despairingly by members. So, we decided to grasp the nettle and give it a good airing - with the opportunity to share in pictures and out loud what really bugs us, to listen to what measures the Council are taking to improve things, and to provide them with our own views and ideas. There was a constructive exchange. We were pleased to hear that there are plans for a more pro-active approach to dealing with contaminated recycling bins. A new MURF - Multi Use Recycling Facility – shared with other local authorities is in the 2024/5 pipeline and will be able to recycle a wider range of materials, particularly plastics. There are also plans for a food waste collection. New government legislation will see the requirement for a welcome common approach to recycling across the country - although question marks remain about how this change will be funded.

We will be following up all the good ideas with Ian Collins after the holiday to make sure they don’t get lost- as well as taking up extra questions asked on the night. We’ll keep you posted. (Notes of the meeting with more details will be available on the website).

TEAMWORK RESULTS IN SUCCESSFUL END OF YEAR CLEAROUT.



As you know, each year we work closely with the University of Southampton and the Council to plan for the end-of-year student clear-out and mitigate its effects. We reckon this year has been the most successful to date with noticeably less issues and mess than in previous years (not perfect but a real improvement). This was the outcome of a number of strategies: information to students from the Uni and Students’ Union; information from us at OARA to our known student households, including reminding them to stagger their clear-out; a drop off point at October Books; an additional bin collection on Saturday 1 July funded by the University, and a heroic effort by the refuse team on that day to deal with side waste and contaminated bins. We are still lobbying for a visit from the street sweeping machines while the roads are emptier of student cars, and we have a “wash-up” meeting with all parties soon to review how it went and start planning for the new term! Thank you to everyone who helped show that joined-up thinking and working together really do pay off!

LONG-STANDING COMMITTEE MEMBER STANDS DOWN

Phine Dahle, one of the longest-standing members of the OARA Committee, has decided to stand down. Phine has been a committee member longer than any of us can exactly remember. During that time, she has contributed so much to OARA and to our local community, including joining in with greening, party organising, taking a key role in the Patients' Participation Group at our local surgery, being a meeter and greeter at meetings, welcoming new residents and caring for existing ones, encouraging us to take time out to reflect and, above all, being a tireless champion for the environment. Phine feels it is time to devote more of her energies to her great passion of campaigning on climate change – a decision it's hard to argue with! We shall miss you on the committee but are glad you will still be very much a local resident and OARA friend!

OARA POLICE REPORT

We recently met with our Neighbourhood Police team: Inspector Tim Williams, Sgt Tom Stark and PCSO Georgi Berkov. The good news is that our patch is not viewed as a high-crime area, and the main message for residents is:

- If you see a crime being committed, phone 999
- If you have a concern, phone 101, but this can be frustrating as there's often a long wait.
- More effective, although a bit impersonal, is to go on the Hampshire Police website: www.hampshire.police.uk. At the top of the opening screen, on the left, is a 'Report' box. That's where you report concerns. These concerns are prioritised, and the more reports sent in about the same problem, from different sources, the higher the priority. Your report is important and is not ignored!

CONGRATULATIONS TO RACE FOR LIFERS

One of our longstanding OARA residents and members, Sarah Parsons, completed the recent 5k Race for Life on the Common. She did it in her wheelchair, with a smile and despite the rain! BEVOIS PRIMARY SCHOOL IS LOOKING FOR FOREST SCHOOL VOLUNTEERS

Could you go down to the woods today - or in September maybe? In April, our Councillor Jacqui Rayment, the first Lord Mayor of Southampton, opened the Forest School at our local Bevois Town Primary - an area of the grounds that has been reclaimed and turned into an exciting new outdoor adventure space.



The school is now looking for regular volunteers, on a Wednesday or Friday, to be extra eyes and hands when doing the riskier elements such as firelighting. Forest School activities can include bug hunting, shelter making, campfire cooking, use of bladed tools for woodworking, nature-based games, arts and crafts using natural materials, tree climbing and generally having fun outside, come rain or shine. Sessions will always be led by a qualified teacher and Forest School leader as well as supported by other school staff,

and there will be training on procedures and protocols so that volunteers feel well prepared. All volunteers are subject to thorough safeguarding checks to ensure children's safety. 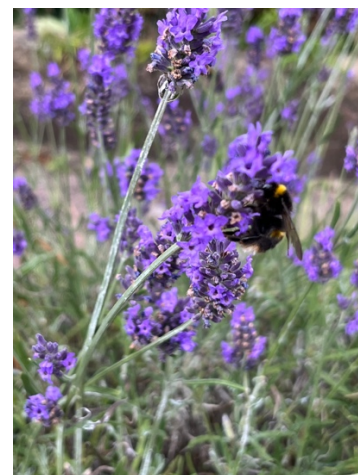
MEET YOUR NEIGHBOUR STREET PARTY
